

UDC-CC Faculty/Staff Highlight

UDC-CC Director of Continuing Education Beverly Lucas was recently appointed as a member of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Task Force for the D.C. State Board of Education.

The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) is a law administered by the U.S. Department of Education (ED) that requires all states to develop educational accountability measurements for all public K-12 schools nationally. ESSA replaced the previous No Child Left Behind Act and required all 50 states and the District of Columbia to create state plans to measure individual schools' success at preparing students for college and/or careers. In the District, that means developing an accountability system for DC public and charter schools that demonstrates how well schools are performing, using academic performance and other factors.

As a member of the ESSA task force, Lucas will assist in making recommendations on:

- School Report Cards each state is required to create a single statewide report card that will help families understand how their public schools, DCPS and PCS are performing.
- Access and Opportunity each state is required to guarantee highquality opportunities for all students. The task force will examine areas of inequity and take steps to resolve them.
- High School Growth the District's ESSA plan currently rewards schools for student achievement, but the plan promises to find a way to identify schools where students are making significant growth toward proficiency.
- Pilot Studies The task force will work with OSSE to identify methods of measuring school quality, and this information will become a part of each school's ESSA accountability score.

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
